In August, Mayor Tory Deschamps, Deputy Mayor Stephen Dillabough, Councillor Joe Martelle, Councillor Chris Ward and Councillor Waddy Smail, together with CAO Sean Nicholson and Interim Clerk Natalie Charette, represented TWPEC at the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) Conference in Ottawa.

Over three days, this group met with Hydro One, the Independent Electricity System Operator, and provincial ministries including Energy and Mines, Infrastructure, Transportation, Environment, Health and Finance. These meetings gave Edwardsburgh Cardinal the chance to present local priorities, seek support, and strengthen partnerships.

AMO is Ontario's annual gathering where municipal leaders meet with provincial representatives to share issues, explore solutions and advocate for their communities. It is an important opportunity to ensure the Township's voice is heard directly at Queen's Park.

With advocacy from MPP Steve Clark and support from the United Counties of Leeds and Grenville, Edwardsburgh Cardinal advanced key files for residents and businesses.

COUNCIL RESUMES REGULAR MEETING SCHEDULE

Council and committee meetings return to the regular schedule in September following the summer condensed calendar.

The Committee of the Whole – Community Development meets on the first Monday of each month. This group advises on planning matters and supports community sustainability by reviewing land use, economic development, and recreation.

The Committee of the Whole – Administration and Operations meets on the second Monday of each month. The committee oversees services such as roads, waste management, water and sewer systems, as well as facilities.

The Port of Johnstown Management Committee meets on the third Monday of each month to guide port operations, which support trade and regional growth.

TWPEC Council meets on the fourth Monday of each month to discuss Township business, pass bylaws, and vote on recommendations from committee meetings.

Meetings are held at 6:30 p.m. and are open to the public and may also be live streamed, giving residents the option to attend in person or watch online.

From Canada Starch to Labourfest

William Thomas Benson opened a starch plant in Cardinal in 1858. It began as Benson & Aspden, later became the Edwardsburg Starch Company, then the Canada Starch Company (Casco), and today operates as Ingredion. This industry helped shape Cardinal's identity as a proud union town and gave rise to the village's Labour Day Festival, now Labourfest, celebrated with a parade, fireworks and more.



1947: Sparks Flew, the Fair Grew

Just days before the 1947 Spencerville Fair, fire destroyed the Townhall. Instead of cancelling, the community pulled together, moving the fair office to the United Church basement and exhibits to the poultry building. Events carried on across the townhall lawn and fairgrounds, a true show of community strength and spirit.

Glowing Limekilns

Crystal Rock once glowed at night. The Gore family's limekilns burned so brightly that locals said the whole hillside shimmered. The community even took the name Limekiln before becoming Crystal Rock in 1907, a nod to both the kilns and the sparkling crystal deposits nearby.
