### KID LIBRARIANS BRING THEIR FAVOURITE BOOKS TO ECPL

### SPRING LOAD RESTRICTIONS IN EFFECT FOR TOWNSHIP ROADS

The Township of Edwardsburgh Cardinal will be

implementing spring load restrictions on designated municipal roads. This was effective Monday, March 17, 2025. These restrictions are necessary to protect road infrastructure during the annual spring thaw period when roads are most vulnerable to damage from heavy vehicles. Spring load restrictions apply to designated municipal roads, as identified by posted signage. The reduced load restrictions limit the weight of vehicles to a maximum of five (5) tonnes per axle, as per Section 122 of the Highway Traffic Act. These restrictions help preserve the integrity of the road base, prevent costly repairs, and extend the lifespan of municipal roadways. Once road conditions stabilize and the risk of damage subsides, the Township will lift these restrictions. A formal announcement will be made when restrictions are no longer in effect. ### **NEW PEDESTRIAN CROSSOVERS**

TWPEC installed three new pedestrian crossovers to enhance safety in Spencerville and Cardinal. These crossovers, equipped with Rapid Rectangular Flashing Beacons (RRFBs), improve visibility and provide safer access for pedestrians at high-traffic areas.

Situated on county roads, these pedestrian crossovers are fully funded by the municipality with the support of the United Counties of Leeds and Grenville. The Township values this strong collaboration in improving road safety for residents and visitors alike.

#### Locations:

- County Road 44 (Bennett Street) at Henderson Street, Spencerville
- · County Road 2 at Dishaw Street, Cardinal
- County Road 2 at Walker Street, Cardinal

The crossovers were activated to coincide with the return of students from spring break in mid-March. Drivers must stop when lights are flashing and allow pedestrians to fully cross before proceeding. Pedestrians should press the button, ensure vehicles have stopped, and cross safely.

### Did You Know? The Township Owns the Port of Johnstown!

The Port of Johnstown is one of Edwardsburgh Cardinal's most valuable assets, serving as a major economic driver for the region.

### A Look Back in History

- 1929-30 Built as a grain transfer facility to move Western grain to Eastern Canada.
- 1958 The St. Lawrence Seaway's opening shifted the Port's role, leading to bulk goods like salt and aggregate.
- 2000 The Township of Edwardsburgh Cardinal acquired the Grain Elevator, wharves, and port lands from the Federal Government.
- Today The Port operates as a tri-modal hub, handling cargo by ship, rail, and truck.

### How the Port is Managed

- Governed by the Port Management Committee (five Council members and four advisory members).
- Employs 28 staff, including management, office personnel, and unionized workers.

### 2024 Highlights

- 1.46 million metric tonnes of cargo processed
- 982,024 metric tonnes of grain handled
- \$7.8 million in capital investments made
- \$5.38 million in surplus (un-audited)
- 26 vessels moved grain—the highest on record
- Destinations: Ireland, Great Britain, Italy, Canada, and other grain elevators

### A New Community Resource Platform for TWPEC

TWPEC officially launched EC Connects, an online platform designed to make it easier for residents to find local services and community resources. Developed in partnership with HelpSeeker Technologies, EC Connects uses the AI-powered Navigi platform to compile a directory of hundreds of local resources. The Township worked closely with community organizations to refine listings, ensuring accuracy and accessibility. Residents and service providers can submit updates using the built-in "Suggest an Edit" tool to keep the information up to date.

Mayor Tory Deschamps emphasized the importance of the platform, stating, "EC Connects strengthens our community by providing easy access to local services and support, fostering collaboration, and ensuring residents can find the resources they need."

The Township encourages residents, service providers, and community groups to explore the platform and contribute to its ongoing growth. Future plans include expanding EC Connects to help connect volunteers with local organizations in need of support.
